#### SOAP BOX RACING COMES TO PARRY SOUND

The Town of Parry Sound is thrilled to announce the hosting of the Parry Sound Soap Box Derby later this year. The Derby, happening on September 16, will pit competitors against one another, as they pilot their homemade soap box cars down the streets of Parry Sound in a race for the championship trophy.

"It's something new and exciting that we think will be enjoyed by Parry Sounders of all ages," said Community Recreation Programs Coordinator for the Town, Brad Weiler. "The idea behind the Derby is to offer something fun and unique that will engage residents and visitors on a number of levels. People can spectate, volunteer, or even register to build a car and race – it's really a collaboration among the community."

The Derby will be open to competitors ages 8 and up, who build or assist in building their own race cars. The Derby will also feature a 19+ race class for the young at heart who don't want to miss out on the action.

#### **Changes to Tax Sales Process**

On May 30, 2017 the Province of Ontario passed the Modernizing Ontario's Municipal Legislation Act, 2017. This act changes certain legislation in the Municipal Act, 2001 City of Toronto Act, 2006 and the Municipal Conflict of Interest Act.

One of the significant changes impacts when a municipality may begin the tax registration process for potential tax sales. Previously, if a property had any outstanding taxes into the third year on January 1 (for example all of 2016, all of 2015 and any of 2014) then the Town could start the tax registration process which leads to a tax sale of the property. Effective May 30, 2017 the act has reduced this period to two years. Therefore, on January 1, 2017 if you owe all of 2016 and any of 2015 you could be subject to tax registration.

The tax registration process remains substantially the same as under the old act, however the waiting period for the Town has been reduced. A reminder that the Town issues taxes twice per year with due dates in March, May, August and October. Residents have the option to enroll in the pre-authorized payment plan which takes the taxes automatically 10 months of the year (rather than four payments).

## **Town of Parry Sound 911 Request**

The West Parry Sound Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to 67 calls of 9-1-1 between January 1, 2017 and March 31, 2017 within the Town of Parry Sound. This is a 6.3 % increase compared to 63 calls during the same period in 2016.

Of those 67 calls, 51 or 76 % were calls placed of a non-emergent nature. These non-emergent calls consist of "Pocket Dials", accidental dials and children playing with phones. The OPP is mandated to respond to all 9-1-1 calls for service to promote public safety and security.

The West Parry Sound OPP would like to remind everyone that 9-1-1 are for emergencies ONLY and offer some tips to avoid unnecessary calls:

- 1. Lock mobile phones or place them on "stand-by" by using the keypad lock feature. If your mobile has a 9-1-1 auto-dial feature, you may be able to disable it. Check the user manual to see if your phone has the ability;
- 2. Don't program 9-1-1 into your speed dial. It only takes a second to dial 9-1-1;
- 3. Do not place your cell phone in a position where keys can accidentally dial. Use a case or holster to protect it when you put it away;
- 4. Do not let children play with a household phone or old cell phones. If a phone has a battery in it, even if it is out of minutes or does not have a contract or service, it can still dial 9-1-1.

The OPP reminds you that 1-888-310-1122 is available 24/7 for non-emergency calls for service in Ontario.

## **Water Rates**

Town staff often hear concerns from citizens regarding the water and wastewater rates. This subject can be quite complicated, however a basic overview follows.

Water and wastewater services are self-funding, property tax dollars are not used to fund these services, therefore rates need to adjust to cover the costs of the system (both operating and capital). Several years ago the Province passed new water guidelines which require that the Town have a financial plan to fully fund the water system. In 2012, the Town passed the rate bylaw setting water and wastewater rates to 2020 based on an external consultant's report. It should be noted that recent data has shown that our water and wastewater operations are fully funded by the water and wastewater rates, and are sufficient to provide for the replacement of existing water and wastewater infrastructure. Of the 12 municipalities in North Eastern Ontario with a population above 4,500 with a water system, only 7 are bringing in sufficient user fees to fund their systems, the others are under funded. As well, larger municipalities have the benefit of spreading the fixed costs of operating their facilities over a larger customer base. The Town is subject to the same quality standards as other municipalities, however we have a smaller customer base through which to fund the service.

Like many municipalities, the Town has aging infrastructure which requires replacing. In 2009, when municipalities began recognizing their assets in financial statements, it became clear that there was a growing gap between what municipalities needed to replace in the future and what they were funding for. The cost to replace this infrastructure increases every year, the estimated replacement value for all of the Town's assets is over \$290 million which is over double the historical cost of the assets. Some of the infrastructure in the ground is over 70 years old and is approaching its replacement date. It is more fiscally responsible to replace large sections of old pipe than to constantly return and make repairs (thus why you have seen large infrastructure renewal projects over the last 3 years).

As a municipality in the Province of Ontario, other than the City of Toronto, the Town is only allowed to levy property taxes. We do not have the ability to levy income taxes, sales taxes etc. The Town is able to charge user rates, such as water rates, when the service provided can be tracked to an individual level. Many of our services cannot be broken out to the individual level, which results in their costs being included in the tax levy. Provincial grants have been significantly decreasing over the last decade which further increases the responsibility for funding the services to the municipal ratepayer.

The Town is currently reviewing the water rate structure to determine if it is the best approach for the needs of our ratepayers. Staff will be bringing a report to Council with a recommended rate structure; a public consultation process will occur before any changes are finalized.

## **Strategic Priorities Setting Meeting**

Council held its second annual Strategic Priorities Setting Meeting, May 30th. A number of potential projects involving private property were discussed in Closed followed by a live-streamed Open Council meeting.

#### Key projects were discussed and prioritized including:

- Great North Rd. / Champagne St. Infrastructure rated very highly
  In follow up to last year's Strategic Priorities Meeting, engineers have been engaged for the past
  several months carrying out engineering design work for replacement of infrastructure along
  Great North Rd. and Champagne St. The engineering work is to be done so that when development on the waterfront materializes, the actual infrastructure work can start relatively quickly.
- Parry Sound Rd. Extension to Oastler Park Drive rated very highly
   Council reaffirmed the long-term importance of planning for the extension of the road by
   directing that the pre-engineering study that was started be completed. Significant waterfront
   development will have to be started or committed to before the road extension estimated to cost
   \$9 Million would be authorized.
- Innovation Business Park rated important
   Council directed that a feasibility study be undertaken by a consultant to determine whether
   establishing an innovation business park in Parry Sound is practicable. Terms of reference for
   the study will be developed and a call for proposals made. Senior Government funding for the
   study will be pursued.
- Tourism rated important
   There has been much emphasis over the years on 'diversifying from tourism' so our local economy isn't so dependent on this one economic driver. The West Parry Sound Area Municipalities undertook a Tourism Study in 2016 but couldn't agree on implementation. Some tourism related initiatives underway by the Town include the Visitor Information Centre at the Stockey Centre, establishing a Tourism Steering Committee and partnership with Explorers' Edge.

Next steps are to build the feedback from Council into the 2018 Budget and 10 Year Capital Budget Forecast. Council's first budget meeting will likely be held in September.

## **Façade Improvement Program**

The Council for the Town of Parry Sound has budgeted \$25,000 for the façade improvement program this year. The purpose of this program is to allow business operators the chance to improve the face of their building. Either a property owner or a business operator are able to apply.

The program provides a 50/50 cost sharing between the Town and business owner/operator. Most commercial facades, signs, landscaping and exterior improvements are eligible for consideration.

#### **Beautification of our Town**

The Town of Parry Sound has announced a new initiative, celebrating and recognizing the community members who contribute to the beautification of our Town through the spring and summer months. The Parry Sound in Bloom contest is the latest addition to a series of neighbourhood competitions aimed at enhancing the civic beauty of Parry Sound.

Parry Sound in Bloom will recognize the outstanding efforts and achievements of front-yard gardens in 1 of 3 categories: general, natural and edible. "The general category recognizes those gardens that are simply pleasing to the eye. The natural gardens feature plant species that are native to the area and attract local wildlife and insects, while the edible gardens feature edible plants, flowers and leaves," said Brad Weiler, Community Recreation Programs Coordinator for the Town.
